Bachelor of Arts - History & Classics

The Academic Calendar contains course descriptions, program and graduation requirements as well as details regarding fees and important dates. To graduate with a BA in History or Classics, there are three main requirements:

Satisfy requirements of the Arts Core



24h in MINOR or satisfy requirements of 2nd MAJOR



Satisfy requirements of your MAJOR (History or Classics)

120h in total as well as a minimum of 2.0 GPA are required in addition to the above.



The Arts Core

All students in a Bachelor of Arts Program are required to complete 30 credit hours as follows:

- 1. 6h in ENGLISH at the 1000-level (not ENGL 1313 / ENGL 1323)
- 2. 6h in a single LANGUAGE other than English
- 3. 6h in SOCIAL SCIENCES (Economics, Politics, Sociology or Women's and Gender Studies)
- 4. 6h in the FACULTY OF PURE & APPLIED SCIENCES (Biology, Chemistry, Computer Science, Geology, Math, Nutrition, Physics or Psychology)
- 5.6h in HISTORY or CLASSICS at the 1000-level

MINOR Requirements

All BA students are required to complete a minor of 24h in a single subject or multidisciplinary area except Music and Theatre majors. Mutidisciplinary minors offer an alternative to completing the minor requirements for a BA in a single discipline. In addition to the Program Requirements listed below, students must also satisfy the Bachelor of Arts (Major) requirements as outlined in the Academic Calendar (pages 46 - 47).

Students must complete a minimum of 42h towards the Major program as follows:

- 1. 6h in either Greek (GREE 1103 & GREE 1113) or Latin (LATI 1103 & LATI 1113), or equivalent
- 2.36h in Classics courses

In addition to the Program Requirements listed below, students must also satisfy the Bachelor of Arts Honours requirements as outlined in the Academic Calendar (pages 46 - 47).

Students must complete a minimum of 60h towards the Major program as follows:

- 1. 6h from Greek or Latin
- 2.36h in Classics courses at any level
- 3.12h in Classics courses at the 3000-level
- 4. CLAS 407T / CLAS 408T



In addition to the Program Requirements listed below, students must also satisfy the Bachelor of Arts (Major) requirements as outlined in the Academic Calendar (pages 46 - 47).

Students must complete a minimum of 48h in the Major program as follows:

- 1. HIST 1003, and an additional 6h of History courses at 1000-level
- 2.18h of History at the 3000 level
- 3.21h of History at any level (above 1000)
- 4. Fulfill department breadth requirement (6h each of North American, Thematic and World History)
- 5. Only 9h of History courses at the 1000-level may be counted for major credit

In addition to the Program Requirements listed below, students must also satisfy the Bachelor of Arts with Honours requirements as outlined in the Academic Calendar (pages 46 - 47).

Students must complete a minimum of 60h in the Honours program as follows:

- 1. HIST 1003, and an additional 6h of History courses at 1000-level
- 2.18h of History at the 3000 level
- 3. HIST4903, HIST 407T/408T and additional 6h of History at 4000-level
- 4.18h of History at any level (above 1000)
- 5. Fulfill department breadth requirement
- 6. Only 9h of History courses at the 1000-level may be counted for major credit
